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MUWCI celebrates 10th Anniversary

Pune: The Prime Minister of India, Dr. Manmohan Singh today presided over the 10th Anniversary celebrations of the Mahindra United World College of India (MUWCI) at Paud near Pune. He also dedicated his Republic Day to the nation first ever 75 acre Bio Diversity Park, which is a special MUWCI project committed to promoting the conservation of our environment. Instituted in 1997, MUWCI is part of the international United World Colleges movement, which also has colleges in Canada, Hong Kong, Norway, Singapore, Italy, Swaziland, UK, USA and Venezuela.

About the Biodiversity Park

The VAN VIHAR Biodiversity Park and Reserve is divided into two parts. The first part is the BIO-DIVERSITY PARK and the second is a CONSERVATION RESERVE.

The Bio-diversity Park, consisting of about 75 acres, includes the built up area of the college and consists of diverse flora and walking trails with

informative signage for the benefit of students, visitors, researchers, etc.

The Conservation Park, consisting of about 95 acres, is intentionally kept away from human activities. This continuous piece of land provides the large corridors and private areas that higher fauna need. The forest department has agreed to add an additional 80 acres of forest land to this area to make it a larger reserve. The park includes a well developed Medicinal Garden, a Butterflt Garden, an Art garden and a Sacred Grove which will collectively inspire students to take up research projects related to ethno-medicine, alternate energy sources, eco-conservation and gene-pool restoration.

The Bio Diversity Project at the MUWCI will focus on water harvesting and stream restoration, pathways and trails, and cataloguing of birds, moths, butterflies, shrubs, climbers, and trees on campus. In the next ten years the college will be totally dependent on renewable energy sources that will be generated on campus.

Van Vihar will also function as an invaluable research resource for colleges and research institutes in and around Pune and also aims to inspire other educational institutions, corporates and NGOs to develop projects such as this in future.

About Mahindra United World College

The Mahindra United World College of India, part of the United World College movement, was founded by the late Harish Mahindra in 1997. It is the Group's endeavour to promote world-class education with an emphasis on

the ideals of peace and understanding, central to the ethos of the United World Colleges. The school is global not only because of the International Baccalaureate degree, but also because of the true international culture in which the students study, live and learn. Each year's batch of about 100 students accommodates about 65 to 70 from abroad. The faculty includes professors from Argentina, Australia, Austria, Cameroon, Canada, Colombia, Ecuador, France, Germany, India, Italy, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Sweden, South Africa, UK and USA. The teacher-student ratio is 1:9. This international mix facilitates global exposure and helps students transcend all artificial barriers based on race, religion, ethnicity, class, gender or nationality. Keen focus is given on all-round development, and students are encouraged to think innovatively by involving themselves in socially and environmentally relevant issues. The students also contribute to the local neighbourhood through unique community service programmes.

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
